# Where can you use your snowmobile in Oak Creek?

Well, the snow is falling and soon, there will be enough for people to want to enjoy the use of their snowmobiles/ sleds. Chief Ralph wants to remind everyone that **snowmobile use is prohibited on the streets and alleys** in the Town of Oak Creek. Town officials don't allow snowmobile use on our roads or alleys because of a number of reasons, all of which relate to the safety of the user. Use of your snowmobile on Town roads and alleys could result in citation(s) and impoundment of your sled.

Colorado Parks and Wildlife have asked Town officials to remind everyone that snowmobiles need to have current/valid registration stickers. Registering your snowmobile aids in recovery of stolen sleds. The fees fund search and rescue efforts and create more and better trails for those who enjoy these machines.

Winter's around the corner; coming soon: Holly Fest, the ice rink opens, Rossi Meadows X-country ski trails, snowshoeing on the Oak Creek Mountain Park trails and family fun on the Moffat Avenue sledding hill.

#### **Snow Removal Reminder**

We would like to take this opportunity to remind all residents of the Town's ordinances on snow shoveling, plowing and parking. It is very important that everyone does their part for the safety of our community and the efficiency of snow removal services by considering the following steps:

- Anyone who has the ability to park off the streets and out of the alley right-of-ways simply should do so.
- On trash day DO NOT put trash or recycling cans out where the snow plowing equipment may hit them. Keeping them back in your driveway or on the sidewalk will avoid any problems.
- Remove trash cans from town right-of-ways ASAP after trash has been picked up.
- All vehicles that are parked in or on town roads, alleys and other rights-of-ways must be MOVED out of
  these areas within 24 hours after the start of a snow storm for the plow crews to do cleanup work. This
  does not mean shoveling around them, it means MOVING them. Any vehicle not moved within this time
  period will be towed at the owners' expense.
- Plowing, shoveling or blowing snow into or across public right-of-ways is unlawful and will result in citations being issued. If there is no alternative, please contact the Public Works Director, (970) 736-2459, to discuss obtaining written permission to use the Town's right-of-ways for snow storage.
- Main Street businesses that have permission to shovel their sidewalks into Main Street need to shovel the snow out two or three feet into the road and avoid piling snow into the gutter.
- By clearing driveways of snow to the RIGHT side of drive (as you face out to the street) the next time the plow comes by it will not get pushed back into the driveway. Again, do not push snow out into the street!

#### **LEAP Information**

The Colorado Low-income Energy Assistance Program (LEAP) is a federally funded program that helps eligible hard-working Colorado families, seniors, and individuals pay a portion of their winter home heating costs. LEAP is designed to <u>assist</u> low-income households with paying their winter home heating costs but is not intended to pay the entire cost. Eligible recipients can receive only one LEAP benefit per heat season. The heat season runs from November 1<sup>st</sup> – April 30<sup>th</sup>.
